Notes and Pictures from David Ungers

Here is a bit of history of how my father and uncle decided to get into the business.

In 1935, my grandfather fit an old White Motor Co. truck chassis with a wooden body. "The vehicle had a chain drive and solid rubber tires", quoted directly from my father in the Cleveland Plain Dealer, September 30, 1970, in an article called *Madison Brothers Join Motor Home Boom*. The article continues to say, "The motor home his father (my grandfather) built had a body of 2-by-4 lumber covered with house siding." Unfortunately, I do not have a photo of this to show you. This might have been what sparked the interest of my father and uncle in the motor home business.

My father, Paul Ungers, and uncle, Matt Ungers, started the company in 1964 in Madison, OH, on 3200 County Line Rd. They designed and built the motor homes themselves. It began with a ply-wood shell (body) in order to make a fiberglass mold which, in turn, made the fiberglass molded shell (body) with steel and wood roll-bars which are laid inside the shell (body) and are fiber-glassed in place. By "all hand laid up", I mean laid by hand, rather than sprayed with chop-guns as they are today, which makes it more of a durable shell design. The first few motor homes off of the assembly line were called "Redi-Go Traveler". These were on a Chevy chassis with a straight-6 cylinder engine. After a few years, they were renamed the "Ungers Crown Commander". Though the Ungers Crown Commander used a Dodge chassis and an International chassis, the Dodge chassis was the most popular with about 800 motor homes being manufactured within the 10 years of business.

In your letter, you asked how the Ungers Crown Commander compared to the Dodge Travco. The one-piece molded fiberglass shell the Ungers Crown Commander had is better, in comparison to fiberglass motor homes created with multiple pieces, which is how the Travco was created. The one-piece molded fiberglass shell was more expensive to make in its day, though it is overall stronger and more durable; obviously, there are no water leaks through the seams as there is with a traditional motor home today. As I said in previous e-mails, the Ungers Crown Commander was one of a kind with all custom molded fiberglass including outside doors, front grill work, one piece bathroom, engine hatch, dashboard and a custom wooden interior cabinetry.

In 1974, the company went out of business due to climbing gas prices, sales dropping, and the high cost of manufacturing.






hand-crafted construction

Ungers Crown Commanders are slowly and carefully built to exacting specifications by master craftsmen. It takes a little longer, but the result is a motorhome worthy of its name: Ungers Crown Commander.

Bodies are hand-laid multiple layers of fiberglass mat and cloth fused together with fiberglass resin. Tubular steel roll bars are spaced the length of the coach and molded-in to keep the body permanently square, rigid and warp-proof.

Floors are built-up and insulated, to a full 4½" thickness, encased in fiberglass then mounted on the chassis before sealing to the body. This gives a strong, solid foundation that won't rust, corrode or rot -- ever!


Steel roll bars in front of and behind the driver provide safety and protection up front plus a firm support for the leak-proof wrap-around windshield. A lower engine console, foam-padded dashboard, padded ceiling, cabinets without protruding knobs, drapery rails that hug the walls - these are just a few of the many safety extras built into every Ungers.





